




# 12 Things You Gotta Have for Art Journaling

### Art Journaling - Where do You Begin?



**Art Journal:** a journal in which you combine color and words (if you like) to express yourself, chronicle your life or experiences, for self-expression, to let off steam or just for the fun of creating.

An art journal can take many forms. I wrote **NORMAL Doesn't Live Here Anymore** and realized well after it was finished that it was not only a book, but also an art journal.

When I became intrigued with art journaling, just for the fun of doing it, I had no idea where to begin. This class is all about choosing some basic art supplies so you can get involved with this wonderful, freeing art form.

# 2 - Stencils



**Stencils:** Cardboard, plastic, and metal are common stencil materials which allow the design to show on the surface below.

- Found Objects plastic fencing, rug hooking canvas, sequin waste (punchinella), drywall tape, produce bags, etc. (anything with holes or a pattern in it)
- Don't forget to check children's art supplies source of great stencil shapes and letters.

### 3 - Stamps



Stamps: Motif stamps or those with personal significance are great to include.

- Rubber stamps mounted or unmounted (if you want complete impressions, use the wood mounted stamps or a stamp block to hold your unmounted stamps) in a variety of shapes, sizes and patterns. You can often find bins of inexpensive stamps at craft stores that work really well for art journaling.
- Hand-carved stamps created from plastic eraser material or stamp-carving material. Inspiration for patterns is everywhere. Just look around.
- Foam Stamps bold images that are especially good to use with paint.
- Bubble Wrap great with paint for adding texture on a journal page.
- Letters, Numbers and Date Stamps

# 4 - Inks



Inks: available in pads, sprays, or bottles of intense color.

- Permanent Ink Pads those which do not reactivate when water or other wet media is applied over them. These include Archival Inks, Staz-on Inks, Memento and Versafine.
- Dye Inks that DO reactivate with water Ranger Distress Inks which should be used as a last layer on your page if you are going to use additional wet media.
- Spray lnks some are permanent and some are not.
- Permanent inks include SEI Tumble Dyes which may be used full strength or diluted with water.
- Non-permanent inks include Dylusions Ink Sprays as well as many others.
- Acrylic Bottled Inks like Liquitex Professional Acrylic Inks are permanent when dry. These can be used straight from the bottle or diluted in water and sprayed, too.

### 5 - Pens



**Pens:** People who like to art journal are always looking for pens that write as they wish. Try your pens on different colors and paper surfaces to see what you like.

- Ballpoint Pens Bic is a good brand and writes over most anything.

# 6 - Paint

Glue: for collage and adding ephemera (and an old brush)

Tape: adding items to a page or as texture or color
